Reliability Ireland 2017 is a forum for the sharing of knowledge and industry best practice in the latest developments in condition monitoring techniques. To encourage discussion amongst delegates, we are coordinating peer-reviewed technical papers and poster sessions on the latest innovations, research and technological thinking.

We invite you to submit a paper or poster for review by an international Technical Programme Committee.

The **deadline** for submission is **Friday 30th June 2017**.

The Programme Committee will review all proposals to choose which they believe are the most advanced, innovative and thought-provoking. All accepted papers and posters will be published and displayed during the conference.

Authors of successful papers will be invited to make a presentation during the Reliability Ireland conference in September 2017. The best paper will also receive the accolade of the Best Conference Paper.

Submission Instructions

TelLab will offer a variety of publication formats, including full papers, short papers and posters. Full papers are limited to 8 pages; short papers are limited to 4 pages; poster abstracts are limited to 2 pages. Submissions should be written in English. The Program Committee reserves the right to determine whether a submitted paper is accepted for presentation as a long paper, short paper, or poster.

Technical Papers and Posters submissions should be of the highest quality, highlighting excellence and substance in a clear and concise presentation.

1. Full Papers (8 pages)

Full papers are for mature work, requiring lengthy explanations of the conceptual background, methodology and data and analysis. Full paper submissions should state: (a) the major issue(s) addressed, (b) potential significance of the work, (c) the theoretical and methodological approach(es) pursued, (d) major findings, conclusions, implications, and (e) relevant scholarly references. Moreover, the relevance to the theme of the conference should be made clear.

2. Short Papers (4 pages)

Short papers are for work that makes significant contributions, but that is still in progress, of



smaller scale, or that can be reported briefly. Otherwise, the same criteria apply as listed for full papers above.

3. Posters (2 pages)

Posters are for work that is in early stages and for novel and promising ideas. The two-page abstract should identify the aspect of the work that will likely lead to productive discussions with conference delegates in a poster session, including figures exemplifying the visual support to be provided for these discussions in the poster.

Guidelines

1. The synopsis should describe a substantially new paper or poster. Proposals which have already been published or presented elsewhere will not be accepted.
2. Consider if a poster meets your requirements better than a paper and select the appropriate option in the online submission form.
3. Proposals must be written in English language.
4. Should your paper be selected for inclusion and presentation, the delivering speaker must be sufficiently proficient in verbal English language, to answer questions from the audience.
5. Be clear and concise. Describe the advance or concept that will be the key topic of your paper or poster highlighting what is unique, showing how it will improve existing systems or practices and explaining its background.
6. Synopses should typically be no more than 300 words in length.
7. Offers of reviews or historical papers will only be accepted if they draw strong and relevant conclusions about future directions.
8. If the proposal describes experimental work, mention what the results (or anticipated results) show and explain what the impact might be.
9. Products or service pitches will not be accepted. However, contributions explaining the use of technology in products or services may be considered.
10. If you intend to use tools such as simulations, demonstrations or 3D graphics to help an audience understand your presentation then please say so.
11. You may find it helpful to prepare your text off-line in a word processing programme before cutting and pasting them into the website template. By neglecting to adapt detailed paragraphs and statistical tables into text bullets and charts, they make it harder for their audience to quickly grasp the key points of the poster.
